1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Vijayam Science and Arts Degree College is located at the prime area in Chittoor town, Rayalaseema region of Andhra Pradesh state within the vicinity of bus stand and railway station. Chittoor is known for its cultural diversity, ethnicity, multi-lingual geography and Sri Varasiddhi Vinayaka Swamy Temple, Kanipakam. It gave birth to prominent personalities like world renowned philosopher Jiddu Krishnamurthy, great educationist Sri Kattamanchi Ramalinga Reddy, former speaker of Lok sabha Sri Ananthasayanam Iyengar, industrialists, writers, film personalities, politicians, philanthropists, lawyers, doctors, scientists – all contributed a lot in shaping Chittoor to put in higher echelons of success.

Imbibed by these qualities, Vijayam Science and Arts Degree College, affiliated to Sri Venkateswara University, Tirupati (the abode of Lord Sri Venkatewara) was established in the academic year 2003-04 with a humble beginning in a rented building. Inatitution was started with two parograms B.Sc and B.Com and a total intake of 90.

Over the years, the Institute created records in University results and campus placements better than the engineering stream. Many of the major multinational companies rated the institution as the available source of the best cream of human resources. The Institute has very good infrastructure facilities for curricular, Cocurricular and Extra-curricular activities. At present the total strength of the institution is three thousand and thirty eight in 1st, 2nd and 3rd year degree courses, supposed to be one of the highest student intake in the area. A thumping 1894 number of students got placements in various MNCs in the last five academic years, a record in the region of affiliating university.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Vijayam Science and Arts Degree College, which is affiliated to Sri Venkateswara University, follows the curriculum designed by the university. The curriculum is revised by the affiliating university keeping in mind the changing social and global needs of employment to the students. The Institution plans various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities based on the academic calendar issued by the affiliating university.

The institution strictly adheres to the academic calendar issued by the affiliating university from time to time.

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The Institution is currently offering Eight UG programs and Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)/elective course system has been implemented in all the programs. The institute strives to educate students on emerging technologies through add-on or value-added courses. Furthermore, the college offered about 10 value added courses per year and more than 70% of the students took part in these courses during last five years.

The curriculum of the university not only focusses on the technical and core areas of the programs, but also addresses and integrates into curriculum crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability. The curriculum has about 40% of the courses belong to project work or field work or internship and all enrolled students successfully completed these courses. Majority of the students were benefited from experiential learning through field trips, project works and internships in the last five years.

The Institution believes in equal participation of all stakeholders for overall development of the students and the institution. Through does not have direct control over the curriculum, the institution takes feedback on design and review of curriculum from Students, Teachers, Alumni and Employers and analyzes it. Corrective actions are taken to make the curriculum relevant and useful to the current needs of the industry.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution follows the process of admitting students to the programs through a transparent and well administered mechanism. Seats are filled against the reserved categories as per the reservation policy of the Government. The teacher assesses the academic proficiency of the students based on their performance in classroom discussions, tests and assignments. Equal attention is paid to slow and advanced learners. Remedial courses are conducted for students to strengthen their basics in various subjects. Advanced learners are motivated to explore their knowledge and share with the slow learners.

The institute has been recruiting faculty through a transparent mechanism and provides equal opportunity to all the faculty. The institute has been maintaining more than required number of faculty for imparting quality education. The teaching learning methods include both ICT and traditional classroom practices that make learning more effective. Teachers are encouraged to adopt innovative methods in teaching. The institute has mentoring system in place where each mentor is assigned about 25 mentees to look after their performance and guide for a better career.

The college maintains a robust internal assessment mechanism to monitor the process and progress of assessment. After thorough assessment, the internal assessment marks that were allotted to the students are sent to the university to publish the final results. Assessment related grievances are addressed by the concerned faculty. Moreover, the escalation mechanism is also available to the students if the grievances are not resolved.

Program outcomes and course outcomes are outlined by the university and they are designed to equip students to gain required knowledge and skills. Student's performance is seen as the realization of learning outcomes on a successful completion of course or program. As a result, many students got placed during the campus drives.

The institution takes utmost care to make sure that all students pass the semester end examinations with high score. The institute has an average pass percentage of about 90% during last five years. Furthermore, feedback is taken from the students on teaching-learning process and actions are taken based on the analysis of the feedback received.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution takes an initiative to support research interests and innovation skills amongst the faculty members and students. The college encourages its teachers to submit research papers to publish in the journals. Many teachers in the college have published their research findings in the peer-reviewed journals with good impact factors. Furthermore, many faculty members have published books/book chapters.

The institution has been actively taking part in extension activities to help the needy and underprivileged in the society through its services. Apart from the academic aspect, opportunities are created to support for the holistic development of the students through several community outreach programs organized by NSS Unit of the institution. More than 80% of the students took part in extension activities during last five years.

The college has two NSS Units through which college renders its social and community services. The NSS unit organizes a wide range of activities that contribute to environmental protection, AIDS awareness rally, Blood Donation Camps, Sapling Plantation, Water Conservation, Health and Hygiene. The Institute conducted more than 50 extension and outreach activities during last five years. Special focus is given to outreach programs that contribute to environmental sustainability, awareness of gender (in)equalities, and promotion of well-being of students and staff. As a result of these activities, the received more than 15 recognitions and awards during last five years.

The institution through the collaboration maintains a closer contact with the local community and industry. It helps to keep the academic activities more realistic and also expand the scope of learning experience to the students. About 35 collaborations are made with the industries of various sectors for the purpose of training the students to upgrade their and knowledge transfer in their career growth.

Every effort is made to establish enriching meaningful collaboration with academic and non-academic institutions. In the last five years the college signed about 20 MoUs with reputed companies to train and enhance the skills of the students through internships, projects, and industrial visits. These collaborations provide opportunities for internship and career growth and overall development of the students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Vijayam Science and Arts Degree College has well established infrastructure for curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Moreover, the college has been consistently upgrading its physical, academic and technological infrastructure to keep abreast of changing times and evolving needs of the students. The administrative facilities include Principal Office, Management Room, Staff Rooms, Laboratories, Training and Placement Room, Seminar Halls, Administrative Room, and Common Room for girls among others.

The college has sports facilities that include volleyball, tennis, basketball court and cricket practicing net for outdoor games chess and carom boards for indoor games. In addition, the institute has facilities to conduct cultural events. The college promotes socialization by organizing cultural activities in the open stage. The sound system and musical instruments are also available for conducting cultural activities. Facilities like Gym and First Aid are provided for fitness of the student.

The institution adopts policies and strategies for adequate technology for deployment and maintenance. The college campus is Wi-Fi enabled and has 100% ICT enabled classrooms and seminal halls. The institute has fiber internet connection of speed 100 Mbps (FTTH) to cater to various academic needs. Adequate computers

are also available in the institution so that each student can make use of them. In addition, some of the students are provided with laptops for doing their project works and reports.

Uninterrupted power supply is ensured in the campus through UPS and invertors along with alternative power supply resources using generators and solar power. Purified drinking water is supplied to the students to ensure the health of the students. The institute offers transport facility even to remote areas where public transport is unavailable.

The library has a diverse collection of books, print journals, news papers and magazines, access to e-journals and e-books through DELNET. Maintenance of computers, library, laboratories, classrooms and sports is done periodically. The institute also arranges for preventive maintenance of various facilities so as to reduce the breakdown. Maintenance of various facilities is done through Annual Maintenance Contracts. The institute has developed adequate infrastructure and adequate resources in the campus to achieve its objective of quality education.

Student Support and Progression

The institution admits the students as per the norms and regulations set by the government and affiliating university from time to time. More than 87% of the students receive scholarship from the government of Andhra Pradesh. Additionally, the institute offers scholarship to the enrolled students. The institution provides maximum support to students in their education and progression through fee concessions to help the meritorious students in completing their education.

The institution encourages the students by conducting programs that enhance soft skills, life skills and ICT computing skills and prepares them in perceiving their professional goals. Various career advancement activities including training and placement, career counseling, entrepreneurship development programs for guiding students towards better career are also conducted.

The institution also has a various committees and cells to address student grievances with time bound schedule. Students' grievances and concerns are also addressed through Anti ragging Committee, Discipline Committee, Grievance Redressal Committee, Student Advisory Committee and Counseling Cell. For the support and care of girl students and women faculty the college has provided a well-developed women empowerment cell. Moreover, girls' rest rooms are recreation rooms provided.

Quality education provided and skills enhancement activities conducted by the institution are evident in the placement offers to the students. More than 46% of students get placements every year in Multi-National Companies. The institute also motivates the students to pursue higher education.

Several co-curricular, extra-curricular and sports activities are conducted to facilitate holistic development of the student and emerge as a socially natural individual. The students are provided with quite encouraging atmosphere in the college. Students won more than 20 awards at university/state/national levels events. The college provides a plethora of opportunities in the arena of sports and cultural activities. The institute conducts more than 20 sports and cultural events per year.

The college has an active registered alumni association that has been involved in guiding the students on the contemporary developments in software as well as in other related industry. The Alumni of the institute are spread across the globe with significant progress in their careers.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institute is committed to provide quality education in a conducive learning environment and make a transformational impact on students. The leadership of the institute provides clear vision and mission to the institution. The institute has a Board of Governors (BOG) to plan and monitor various activities of the institution. This governance enabled to introduce new course Bachelor of Hotel Management in the year 2017. The institution functions with the objective of academic development. The institute has a prospective plan and strategic plans to achieve its vision. Strategic plans are monitored periodically so as to achieve the set goals.

Governance and leadership at VSADC entail participative management by the governing body, the principal, teaching and non-teaching staff and the students. These stakeholders collaborate in carrying out their professional responsibilities and in accomplishing the vision and mission of the college. Various committees are framed for the purpose of smooth and effective functioning of the institution.

The institute has implemented e-governance in various areas for effective functioning. Various welfare measures have also been in place for both teaching and non-teaching staff. The Institute extended financial support to more than 30% of the faculty every year to attend conferences and workshops. In addition, the institute also organized more than 20 professional and administrative training programs to its employees. On an average more than 30% of the faculty undergo FDPs every year. The institute has an effective appraisal system in place to shape the career of the faculty.

The institution has system for internal and external auditing procedures. The institute mobilizes its resources effectively for the effective development of the institution.

IQAC has been instrumental in improving teaching-learning activities at the institution level. Moreover, IQAC has brought in various quality initiatives. IQAC implemented Feedback from students on infrastructure and established women empowerment cell to enhance quality aspects at the institute level. In order to improve teaching-learning, the IQAC implemented mentor system and ICT enabled facilities. In addition, IQAC has been taking up various quality initiatives such as ISO certification, IQAC meetings and workshops on quality initiatives from time to time.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Vijayam Science and Arts Degree College maintains a well-balanced gender equity not only in terms of number of job opportunities given to women but also their representation in the Institution. Various strategic steps are taken from time to time to bring sensitivity on the gender related issues and provide an equal opportunity for all the genders. The Institute has taken various steps to minimize, recycle and reuse different types of wastes generated by the Institute.

Natural water resources are effectively utilized by keeping in place waster harvesting pits at various important locations on campus. The Institute has implemented various green practices and promoted and improved ecofriendly environment on the campus. Various audits such as energy, green, and environment are conducted for the Institution. The Institute provides access to various facilities for *divyangans* through its infrastructural facilities.

The Institute regularly celebrates birth/death anniversaries of the great Indian personalities and national festivals every year. Philanthropic activities of the institution to address local societal problems and skill-based training and campus placements have been two best practices implemented by the Institution. Various philanthropic activities such as blood donation, helping the needy and free mineral water to the poor have been some of the activities regularly undertaken by the institution as a part of its social responsibility and for development of the students with awareness on social issues. The Institute also provides skill-based training to the students from first semester onwards. This helped the students to secure a better placement before completion of the graduation.

Vijayam Science and Arts Degree College strives for the holistic development of the students from the first semester of the program. Students are given training on various life skills and are also involved in various outreach and extensions activities so that the students develop responsibility towards society and achieve pinnacle in their careers. 1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Vijayam Science and Arts Degree College is affiliated to Sri Venkateshwara University, Tirupati. The Institute makes every effort in delivering the curriculum prepared and shared by the affiliating university. Effective curriculum delivery is ensured through the following mechanism.

- Curriculum planning
- Well-designed teaching-learning process
- Effective course delivery and its review

Curriculum Planning

The affiliating university regularly updates its curriculum all programs and ensures that the updated curriculum meets the industry expectations from the students in the current and near future job market conditions. Department Academic Committee (DAC) of each department discusses the new updated curriculum at a length to identify the curriculum gaps in the curriculum and proposes the ways to bridge /address the curriculum gaps. The identified curricular gaps are communicated to the affiliating university for enhancing the curriculum and bridge the gaps.

Institute prepares its own semester wise Academic Calendar well in advance before Commencement of semester considering based on Academic Calendar of the University. Subjects are allotted to the faculty members their specialization, experience, and workload for the forthcoming semester, after the end of the previous semester, on finalization of Curriculum Planning. Moreover, faculty are encouraged to get enrolled in courses such as NPTEL, Coursera etc.

The teaching plan is prepared by the individual faculty under the guidance of the Head of the Department. Timetables are prepared for each class, and they are monitored by the class in charges and HoD. It is ensured that the minimum contact hours for theory and laboratory as specified in the university syllabus is strictly maintained. The course coverage is periodically assessed, and any related issues/discrepancies /modifications are discussed in the DAC meeting for effective curriculum delivery. The feedback of the students is regularly obtained through CRs which is an integral and indispensable part of curriculum planning and implementation.

Well-planned teaching-learning process

Faculty members prepares course file for each of the courses and keep all teaching material ready well before commencement of the classes. In addition, faculty identifies and keeps the course specific method of delivery to achieve the course outcomes. Class notes are made available on Institute's website for easy access of the students. All teaching-learning infrastructure facilities, including ICT enabled facilities, are

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checked and made ready before commencement of the classes in each academic year.

Effective course delivery and its review

Course delivery is done as per the lesson plan initially prepared. However, teaching diaries are used to document the actual content coverage on daily basis. Feedback on teaching of the faculty is taken twice in a semester and corrective actions are taken wherever required based on the feedback. HoD of each department monitors the syllabus coverage from time to time and makes sure that effective curriculum delivery is done within given time frame. If, for any reason, any faculty fails to finish his/her syllabus within accurate time (s) he is asked to arrange extra classes for his/her subject to complete the syllabus effectively.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

The institute implements the curriculum given by the affiliating university. The curriculum addresses crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability.

Gender sensitization:

The course on Gender Sensitization is being offered every academic year in the form of both curricular, Cocurricular and extra-curricular activities. This course enables the entire peer group to interface with real life situation such as field work, seminars and social events etc.

The essential objectives of this course include:

- o To generate the awareness regarding equality in law, social system and democratic activities
- To provide an integrated and interdisciplinary approach to understand the social and cultural construction of gender
- To make the young boys' and girls' gender sensitive and create positive values that supports the girls and their rights.
- To educate to the students on the status of women and the impact on development of the nation.
- To enable students to reflect upon their own socialization process and attempt to break the influence.

Furthermore, the institution is conducting several programs with the help of women empowerment cell to address women related issues. This women empowerment cell especially focuses on the awareness and redress of gender sensitive issues, if any. On International Women's Day women empowerment cell conducts various activities regularly through technical associations of the institution. Different topics such as gender equality, respect, and empowerment are discussed in the cell periodically.

Environment and Sustainability:

This course helps the students to understand the importance of ecological balance for overall development and critical thinking skills to provide sustainable solutions. The course "environmental studies" helps to strengthen the students with the importance of environment and its sustainability. To make students strengthen to understand the importance and depth of these areas the Institution conducts debates and group discussion on various topics related to environment and sustainability. On special days like Environmental Day, Earth Day, and World Water Day the institution organising seminars, field visits, Guest Lectures. Students are sensitized about environment and sustainability issues.

Human Values and Professional Ethics:

In every semester the institution is offering a course on human values and professional ethics to create awareness about moral values, character building, cooperation, sustainable relationship among people, and empathy involved in technical activity. This course ultimate aim is to develop professional ethics among students and faculty through the use of software tools to check plagiarism online. Students are guided by the faculty to organise awareness campaigns, blood donation camps, health check-up camps, hygiene, and health awareness programmes. Moreover, the activities related to Swatch Bharat are regularly conducted by the NSS students of the institution.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

After the student joining a programme, the institution identifies the learning levels of the students throughout the duration of the program and take necessary steps at all the stages. Learning levels of the students are identified through the following means.

- *Initial Assessment:* The initial assessment is conducted to assess the student's individual strengths, weaknesses, knowledge level, and analytical abilities prior to instruction. It forms a basis to strategize student specific plan for their overall development. It is done based on the student's performance in intermediate examinations before joining the undergraduate program at the Institution.
- Continuous assessment (internal assessment) and semester end examinations: They provide the means to assess the learning levels of the students in all courses and slow/fast learners are identified accordingly to take up further measures.

Programs adopted to encourage advanced learner

- Students are advised to participate in group discussions, technical quizzes to develop analytical and problem-solving abilities in them and thereby to improve their presentation skills.
- Bright students are motivated and inspired to top the exams at university level.
- Encourage students to take part in discussions or seminar on the advanced topic.
- Various career opportunities are discussed with the students and career plan is suggested to the students.
- The students are encouraged to take part in Industrial visits and industry sponsored internship to explore their talent and enhance their skills.
- Guest lectures are arranged for the students to help them acquire more knowledge about the subject from the experts.
- The mentors give higher goals and tasks and also make the advanced learners get higher levels of personality development and stress management trainings.
- Students are rewarded with incentives to keep up the best performance throughout the period of studies.

Programs adopted to address slow learners

- Personal counseling is done through class coordinators, who take care of the students and entire academic record of the student which is also conveyed to the parents from time to time by the class coordinator.
- Remedial and extra classes are conducted with appropriate focus on the course topic in which the students are found to be slow learners.
- Extra classes are organized to address any questions, if the students have, and critical topics are taught again for better understanding of the students.
- Students are given the additional assignments and are regularly counseled by class coordinator.

- Performance of the students in mid-term exams and end exams are closely monitored for further improving the performance of the students.
- Detailed class notes are made available to the students for better understanding of the complex science concepts.
- Remedial classes are conducted and key concepts are taught to reinforce the understanding of the concepts.
- Students are motivated through various personality development and motivational sessions to excel in studies.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The Institution believes in the adoption of student centric methods to enhance student involvement as a part of experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies. In addition to traditional teaching learning methods, the Institute also adopts innovative methods for enriching the learning experience. This learning leads to a holistic development of students beyond the classroom.

- Quizzes are conducted by faculty in all programs. Final year projects are also done at undergraduate level.

Project based learning

- Report writing, Interpretation of information and current themes in management studies with present trends enhance the student skills of project based learning.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

The institute has transparent and robust internal evaluation process in terms of frequency and variety. The institute's internal assessment is in line with the regulations framed by the affiliating university from time to time.

- Master academic calendar, which includes dates for spell of instructions, dates for various internal assessments etc., is prepared by the Institution on receipt of academic calendar from the affiliating university well before commencement of the semester.
- The principal and HoDs hold meetings with faculty members and guides them to ensure effective implementation of the evaluation process. Students are assessed continuously through various evaluation processes at college level and university level during the study of the program.
- The continuous assessment includes Mid-term examinations, Assignments, Field visits, Field work and Seminar presentation. Schedule of Mid-term examinations and assignments are given in academic calendar which is displayed well in advance before the commencement of session.
- Internal examinations are conducted as per the time slots mentioned in the academic calendar and their dates are made known to all the stakeholders well in advance.
- The frequency of the internal assessment as per the prevailing academic regulations are made known to the students and parents during orientation program conducted before commencement of classes in I year of the study.
- Rubrics are prepared for assessing different types of courses namely laboratory courses, project courses, Seminars etc. and are disseminated to students before start of the semester.
- Syllabus of each course is shared with the students and various assessments involved for different types of course are also shared with the students.
- Question papers set by the faculty for internal examinations are reviewed by the head of the department.
- Answer scripts of the internal assessment are evaluated and shared with the students for any discrepancy.
- Any grievances of the students with respect to the internal assessments are brought to the notice of the faculty. The faculty reviews and resolves the grievances.
- Marks obtained by the students in the internal assessment are also displayed on the respective notice boards of the departments to foster transparency. Personal guidance is given to the poor performing students after their assessment.
- Students are notified of changes, if any, in master academic schedule through the mentors and in class.
- Improvements required in the internal assessments are suggested by IQAC from time to time.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

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Response:

The affiliating university has established a detailed procedure that is transparent, time bound and efficient to address any examination related grievances of the students. The Institute follows the guidelines and rules issued by the affiliating university in dealing with examination related grievances. The institute has a well-structured mechanism to address examination related grievances in an efficient manner which is time-bound and transparent, as explained below.

- The Institute has a dedicated examination cell headed by examination in-charge and supporting by other faculty and staff members.
- A Roving Committee headed by the Principal consisting of all Heads of the Departments and Senior faculty members monitor the total examination system during the Continuous Internal Examinations and Semester End Examinations.
- Evaluated scripts of internal examinations are shown to the students. If student has any questions regarding the evaluation, (s)he approaches the faculty directly and gets doubts clarified. However, if the grievance remains unresolved, a committee is formed by the head of the department /head of the institute to address the issue.
- If any student fails to appear for the internal exam due to valid reason, then the examination is conducted for the student as per norms outlined by the affiliating university.
- Internal evaluation of lab records is done in the presence of students so as to minimize the grievances and make the process transparent. Moreover, Project seminars and student seminars are conducted in the presence of all the students to foster transparency in internal assessment.
- The institute makes every effort not to have any malpractices on campus. However, if any malpractices are found during SEE, then they are referred to the Examination Cell of the institute and are dealt in accordance with the guidelines of the affiliating university.
- If the student has any grievances after publishing final results by the university, (s)he can approach the university through the examination cell of the Institution. Students can apply for recounting/reevaluation of the answer scripts as per the guidelines of the affiliating university to address his/her grievances. The institute informs the students once the grievance is redressed by the affiliating university.
- Final internal marks obtained by the students are displayed on notice boards of the respective departments so that students can check them and bring to the notice of concerned faculty if there is any discrepancy.
- Students' grievances related to Admit Card, Registration Card etc. before appearing for SEE are resolved by the examination cell of the institution while working in tandem with the affiliating university.

Therefore, the examination system implemented in the Institute for CIE and SEE is transparent, time-bound and efficient.

The Institution has a multi-layered, multi-point and multi-faceted process related to communicating the POs. PSOs and COs to the teachers and students.

POs/PSOs and COs are developed in each programme of courses involving all the faculty of the program and are reviewed in the Department Academic Committee meeting after thorough discussion.

Approved POs/PSOs and COs are distributed to the faculty.

Communication to the Students:

COs, POs/PSOs are communicated to the students through the following means.

First year Induction Programme: Dedicated lecture-demos are organized as a part of the Induction Programme in which POs/PSOs are presented and explained to the students.

Introduction of Course Outcomes: Respective COs are presented at the beginning of each course all through the programme

Display of Outcomes in the Department Corridors: Multi-coloured Foam boards depicting the POs are

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placed for wider awareness among students regarding the matter.

Question papers of Continuous Assessment: The questions of continuous assessment exams are set reflecting the COs of the particular course along with cognitive levels of learning.

Trainings and Workshops on OBE: The Institution has been conducting training programs and workshops on OBE to the students, faculty and Non-teaching staff to inculcate the spirit of OBE and disseminate the relevant information.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

Initially attainments of Course Outcomes (COs) are computed using both direct and indirect methods. Attainments of Program Outcomes (POs) and Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) are done from the attainment of COs through course and program articulation matrices. The level of attainment of POs, PSOs and COs are done through faculty course assessment report with thoroughly designed evaluation rubrics. This will help indicating the learning outcomes of the students, employability levels and further progression.

Attainment Procedure of COs: It is done using direct method and in-direct method. As a part of the direct method, CO attainment is computed using marks obtained by the students in Continuous Internal Examinations (CIE) and Semester End Examinations (SEE). Weightages of 25% and 75% are assigned to CIE and SEE respectively to compute direct CO attainment. Course end survey is conducted for each course and indirect attainment of COs is computed. Now 80% and 20% weightages are assigned to direct and indirect CO attainment to calculate total attainment of COs for each course.

Attainment Procedure of POs/PSOs: Attainment of POs/PSOs is done from the attainment of COs. From the attainment of CO and course articulation matrix, direct PO/PSO attainment is done for each course. By using program articulation matrix and PO/PSO attainment of each course, direct PO/PSO attainment for the program is calculated. Indirect attainment of POs/PSOs is done using Program exit survey, Employer survey and Alumni survey. Final attainment of PO/PSO is done by assigning weightages of 80% and 20% to direct and indirect attainments respectively.

3.3 Extension Activities

- Through NSS the volunteers create awareness of importance of women's education and women empowerment.
- Mineral Water Plant, Puthalapattu provides unadulterated water for the locals to decrease the contamination in the surrounding.

The faculty and the students are actively involved in the outreach activities. Major extension activities

carried out by the college in collaboration with NGOs as follows:

- The joint ventures among NSS and other NGOs assist with serving the destitute like "Sisuvihar", "Abhayakshetra" old ageand orphanage serving them with garments, foodmaterials and individual requirements for ordinary exercises.
- On the polling day students worked in conducting elections in coordination with the police and election officials.
- Blood Donation Camp was conducted with the support of Red Cross in collaboration with GovernmentHospitals.

4.1 Physical Facilities

The other supportive facilities on the campus are developed to contribute to the effective ambience for curricular, extra- curricular and administrative activities. Various physical and infrastructure facilities available for teaching-learning at the Institution are mentioned below:

Class Rooms:

The institution has well-furnished, spacious classrooms with good ventilation to conduct classes. Classrooms are maintained as per norms for proper visibility of blackboard and audibility. All the classrooms are ICT enabled and are equipped with fans, lights, LAN/WIFI connectivity.

Seminar Halls:

The institution has vibrant and modern five seminar halls with ICT enabled facilities to conduct seminars, conferences, guest lectures, webinars, and workshops for students and faculty.

Laboratories:

The LMS provides an extensive searching facility by various fields like the Title, Author, ISBN, Keyword, publishers, and domain. All the active book collection is updated in the DELNET Library Management Software database and the Web OPAC is available for the users. The issue and return of books has been activated with the DELNET Library Management Software. MAINTENANCE SECTION:

There is a centralized maintenance section which is headed by a Maintenance Engineer and supported by skilled technicians. This section takes care of maintenance of infrastructural facilities which includes plumbing works, electrical, carpentry, masonry and sewage works. The section receives maintenance requirements from the departments and other sections and undertakes the necessary work following internal operating procedures under the directions given by the concerned head of the department.

INTERNAL OPERATING PROCEDURE:

Any problem that persist in a department is represented to the maintenance in charge through a letter/mail. The in-charge deputes a skilled person/technician to attend the problem. The skilled person resolves the problem on site immediately, if no additional material is required. In case of material requirement, it is received from the maintenance section through an indent. If the material is to be procured from outside, permission is obtained from the maintenance in charge / Head of the Institution and arranged for procurement of material to fix the problem.

1. Physical Facilities

Electrical Maintenance:

Monthly monitoring of electrical equipment such as Generator, UPS, and Batteries is done and its status is entered in the Log/Stock Book. The suppliers/service providers are approached in case of any major fault.

For replacement of any part, quotations are invited and part is procured as per the centralized purchase procedure.

The work done by the service provider are be verified by the respective authorities and a report on completion of work is submitted to the Principal.

Annual inspection of Electrical installations maintenance and safety of Electric supply is done by

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Directorate of Electrical Safety, Government of Andhra Pradesh.

Building Maintenance:

A Civil Engineer and a Supervisor are responsible for new construction works and the civil maintenance of buildings including laying and maintenance of the plumbing, water pipe lines, and sanitary fittings following the internal operating procedure.

Annual inspection is done for Fire Safety by Andhra Pradesh State Disaster Response and Fire Service Department. Pest Control maintenance is done periodically.

Furniture Maintenance:

Institute's maintenance wing maintains the central workshop facility which provides the services including custom fabrication of cabinets, desks, counter tops, installation of doors and windows, and frames for displaying banners.

The internal operating procedures are followed for maintaining the furniture in the institution.

Network / Wi-Fi Maintenance:

The functioning of college intranet and internet facility is monitored and maintained by the hardware technicians in association with Network administrator of Department of Computer Science.

Any up gradations or modifications to the existing Network Model are be carried out by inviting quotations from external agencies following central purchase procedure.

2. Academic Facilities:

Library:

Central library supports text books, reference books, journals and periodicals for issuing to students, staff and faculty.

Digital library caters e-books, e-journals and online resources that can be utilized within the library and also within the campus with proper user credentials.

Library committee monitors the effective functioning of library services.

Laboratories:

Equipment in the laboratories are maintained regularly.

The in-house maintenance and repairs are addressed by the respective department technicians who are qualified and trained.

Major problems and repairs are attended in consultation with the suppliers following the central purchase procedure.

Class Rooms:

Every Department has a faculty in-charge who periodically checks the condition of class room/laboratory amenities like benches, chairs, black boards, fans, lights and LCD's.

The in-charge resolves the problem through the Head of the Department following the internal operating procedure.

Computer Facilities:

Around 333 computers, 03 printers and sufficient scanners are available for the staff and

students.

Computers and software in the laboratories are maintained by computer hardware technicians under the supervision of a senior faculty.

3. Supporting Facilities:

Sports:

The playground and sporting equipment are regularly available and they are maintained under the supervision of Physical Director.

NSS:

The College encourages the students to participate in social and nation building activities. It aims to motivate the students to identify the needs and problems of the community and involve them in problem solving process.

4. Other Facilities:

The Institute has RO plant, which provides 24X7 drinking water facility. Sufficient number of water coolers is available in each of the departments to provide clean drinking water.

The institute has fleet of busses to cater to the transportation needs of the students. In addition, frequent and ample public transport facility is also available as the institution is situated on the main road connecting the town.

Adequate man power is employed to maintain cleanliness of the campus, Classrooms, Staff rooms, Seminar halls and Laboratories, etc. Wash rooms and rest rooms are well maintained.

The Green Cover of the campus is well maintained by full time gardeners.

The campus security is monitored through surveillance Cameras and is maintained by supplier under AMC.

The Institution has a tie-up with Hospitals for providing medical assistance in case of need.

The college principal along with concern HOD discussed on the weak performers teaching learning process. Individual counselling will be held to identify the care reason for the weak performance and prepare the list of measures along with weekly evaluation of implementation of the suggestions given to the concern staff by the HOD. After completion of a weeks of class, the feed back will be collected one more time in the absence of the faculty to find the performance and if the positive results are found, he/she will be appreciated by both the HOD and principal otherwise call for counselling for further. Most of the weak performers charged their work efficiently by observing their seniors and maintained healthy competition teaching learning process.

At the end of even semester HODs evaluation the progress of the teacher according to the document submitted by the concern faculty, give feedback and suggest measures to improve his performance of necessary. At the end of odd semester, the individual's performance is evaluated along with the principal,

chairman and decide the increments after thorough perusal of self-appraisal form.

For non-teaching staff the performance is evaluated on regularity, punctuality and sincerity in service rendered, the immediate reporting authority presents to discuss the performance of the individual to decide salary increment at the end of academic year.

Response:

Coinage of Financial Planning and Management is the forethought of the Institution in achieving systematic development activities. The institution has a strong Financial Management System which conducts regular Internal Audit by authorized Auditors. In addition, the A.P. State Government also conducts audit through Andhra Pradesh State Admission and Fee Regulator Committee (APFRC). It may note that the State Government pay the fee. (Through Reimbursement) of all the eligible students who got admission in the college. Hence, the receipts are very transparent. The college accounts department maintains all the expenditures and income, duly submitted to the Government for every Financial year. The committee (APFRC) considers to revise the fee structure for the next block period the duration of a block period is three years.

The college has a Finance Committee, reviews the financial Planning periodically. The Institute is registered under section 12 A of Income Tax Act. The finance Committee acts as advisory body to GB, On the matters of Finance to the College. The institutions accounts are audited both Internal and External auditors to check the financial compliance. The finance committee makes institute level budget for every financial year.

The Finance Committee reviews the Income and Expenditure Statements and report the same to the Governing body (G.B) for future plan of action regarding the financial matters. Optimal utilization and execution of the budget is monitored through internal and external auditing.

At the beginning of financial year, the annual budget for institute is prepared and proposed, for recurring and non-recurring potential income and expenditure for the year. The departmental budget proposals are made by the H.O. Ds and submitted for the approval of the G.B. through proper channel. The primary source is through collection of Tuition fee and donations from individuals.

Internal Audit:

Qualified and certified internal auditors appointed to audit on regular basis the college auditors conduct audit of accounts on Quarterly basis, verifies all the payments, receipts, vouchers of transactions, cash books, ledgers and bank statements in a financial year. The accounts are also subjected to external auditing.

The auditors prepare and submit the income and expenditure statement and balance sheet and depreciation statement. All the Government scholarships and donations from individuals are audited separately by the auditors. As an act of transparency, the audited financial statements are published as the college website.

QUALITY INITIATIVE - 1

FEEDBACK FROM STUDENTS ON FACILITIES

Mentoring System

Mentoring system, which is nothing but a handholding program for the students, is implemented by the institution for holistic development of the students. This system provides a flatform for the students to interact one to one with mentor and share his/her difficulties and other personal issues that are stopping the students from excelling well in studies and other career-oriented activities.

IQAC has taken an initiative to implement mentor system for improving the academic performance and prepare student for industry requirements. Head of the institution approves the list of mentors from each department and the approved list is shared with the concerned HODs. Each HOD assigns mentees to the mentor and hands over the mentor diaries for recording various activities and data for further reference. Each mentor meets the mentee at least once in 15 days or as often as required and gets to know the about various aspects such as attendance status, academic performance, any personal issues etc. and offers the solutions then and there.

The key points transpired during the discussion are also recorded in the mentor diary. The mentor keeps track of issues reported by the mentee and keeps a record of action taken on the reported issue. The mentoring also goes beyond the campus. The mentor also contacts the parents of the students, is needed, to resolve issues of the students. Once a mentor is assigned to a mentee, the same faculty will continue to be the mentor of the mentee till completion of the program. The mentoring system yielded good results in terms of pass percentage, placements, participation in extension activities etc.

Initiative on Teaching-Learning Reforms - 2

ICT ENABLED FACILITIES

As a part of its process to deploy technology to reform teaching-learning process, the IQAC of the institution transformed the conventional teaching learning resources into ICT enabled facilities. Digitalization is taking place in all walks of life and its use has made life smooth and comfortable. Providing various ICT enabled facilities at the institution is part of digitalization. Currently the institution has almost 100% ICT enabled classrooms and seminar halls.

IQAC explained the advantages of having ICT enabled classrooms and received BOG approval for providing ICT enabled facilities in phased manned in the Institution. The Institution has spent more than 13.90 Lakhs during last five years in upgrading and adding new infrastructure as a part of providing ICT enabled facilities. ICT enabled facilities include Project with screen, LAN, Wi-Fi, access to google classrooms and access to various teaching learning e-resources.

Provision of ICT enabled facilities has been helping the students to understand complex concepts easily. Moreover, the presentation of huge volume of teaching materials is now a click away. Online classes were also conducted through a paid online meeting platform and ICT enabled facilities. Increase in pass percentage of students, Faculty's contribution of publishing book chapters, research publications, and access to learning material online are the direct benefits of implementing ICT enabled facilities by the institution.

Minimize the waste to Maximize the life is the institution's motive. If not avoidable, reduce, recycle and reuse, before disposing any hazardous waste is the chosen thought of responsible minds to enhance the green efforts in maintaining eco-balanced campus. Consistent efforts are made to set paperless office and see the campus as Plastic Free Zone. Waste collection bins are kept maintained at different locations in the campus for the users' convenience.

Awareness sessions and seminars are conducted for students and faculty on significant topics like waste management, eco-friendly and bio-diversity.

Solid Waste Management:

The segregated solid (dry) waste is disposed with the help of municipal vehicle/waste collectors deployed by the Chittoor Municipal Corporation. In addition, Plastic free zone Sign boards are exposed to public view in the campus. Paper and card board wastage is disposed from time to time.

Vermicomposting plant is maintained in the college to convert garden waste and kitchen waste into bio-fertilizer, which is used to supplement greenery and plantation on the campus.

Liquid Waste Management:

Institution has a setup of rain water harvesting pits through which water level is maintained in the bore wells situated in the college campus.

College has RO drinking facility connected with overhead storage tanks to ensure safe water for students and staff all the time. Diluted waste water generated from RO is used for gardening and cleaning kitchen utensils. Sign boards on water conservation are also displayed in the campus.

Bio-medical Waste Management:

Bio-Medical Waste which is generated in the Bio-technology lab during the practical experiments including samples, sample collection container, gloves or any intermediate product is cautiously packed and handed over to municipal vehicle deployed by the Municipal Corporation of Chittoor.

E-Waste Management:

The Institute has a dedicated place to store E-waste which is generated from the Computers lab, Electronics lab, Physics lab and other areas of the institute.

E-waste is reduced through following practices:

- The possible functioning spares are identified and are re-used in the possible areas
- Exchanging of non-functional equipment during the purchase of new equipment

Waste Recycling System:

Special site is allotted for vermicompost pit on the campus. Waste food and grass in the college is used as raw material to produce vermicompost on campus. The produced Vermicompost is used as organic manure for plants on campus.

Hazardous waste management

- Hazardous Waste Disposal in Biotechnology and Chemistry Labs like used / broken test tubes, beakers, left over / spilled chemicals are disposed cautiously.
- Standard precautions are taken while receiving, storing and issuing the hazardous materials and label the safety instructions with regard to waste minimization.

flushed out through the college drain into municipal corporation drain system.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Response:

Best Practice-1

(Philanthropic Activities - Addressing Societal Needs Through Philanthropic Activities)

Vijayam Science and Arts Degree College was established in 2003. Since then, the college is committed to identify and encourage good practices.

Objective:

- To save lives of people through blood donation
- To assist the needy people and help the orphans, old-age homes
- To contribute to the societal goals
- To solve water scarcity problem in the nearby villages

The Context:

The noble objective had its teething as well as challenging designing and implementation. To save the suffering humanity, the students are guided and motivated for voluntary services. The institution inculcates the young minds to value voluntary services and vitalize them to donate and recognize the importance of blood donation. There have been cases where people were unable to find exact blood group.

Blood Donation:

Some people need blood for emergency cases; they don't even know the means to approach the blood bank. With all these concerns the college has set up a team for voluntary blood donations.

Helping the Needy:

Many Orphanages and Old Age Homes are waiting for a helping hand. They always need a kind assistance. Philanthropic help to the needy lead to initiate the concept of 'One-rupee collection' by the institute lends the help to the needy after assessing various parameters.

Societal Goals:

Swachh Bharat mission focus to maintain healthy and disease-free India. A small action of helping in the achievement of clean India, greenery is maintained in the public places.

Safe RO drinking water:

One of the basic needs of the mankind is safe drinking water. There has been water scarcity in the most of the rural areas nearby institution. The lack of safe drinking water is one of the main reasons behind various water-borne diseases in rural people.

The Practice:

Blood Donation:

To cater to all of the above-mentioned issues the college has been active in organizing Blood Donation Camps for 18 years. In 2004 the institution associated with the Indian Red Cross society and started organizing blood donation camps. The college has been consistently in collaboration with the Indian Red Cross society. The head of the Institution is also a member of the Indian Red Cross Society. So far 19 Blood Donation Camps has been conducted and approximately 3000 units of blood have been donated to the blood banks. Every year students enthusiastically come forward to donate blood and help the people in need.

Helping the needy:

The volunteers visit orphanage and old age homes every month to provide necessary commodities and medical help. The institution always helps the student families who are in the dire necessity. There was a fire accident in a student's house and the family was ruined with the fire accident. The institution rendered immediate financial help and provided shelter to the student's family.

Social Responsibility:

The volunteers from the institution rendered their service in creating awareness on road safety for 90 days after college hours in association with traffic Police.

As a part of corporate social responsibility, institution funded for greenery initiation, seating arrangements and their maintenance in the public places like RTC bus station and Chittoor Government hospital.

Safe RO Drinking Water:

The College set up RO water plant in *Puthalapattu*, to ensure safe drinking water in rural areas. This RO plant serves more than 20,000 liters of purified drinking water per day. Institution under takes the maintenance of the RO plant.

The institution created consciousness of valuing voluntary services. Through these activities the energy of the students is channelized for social cause of communal harmony and participation in social activities.

Evidence of Success:

On an average every year, students donate 114 units of blood. The needy persons approach the college desk when they are in need of blood. Our students are ready to donate blood during emergency cases. Institution received "Seva (service) award" from *Biswabhusan Harichandan* (the hon'ble governor of AP) for the meritorious services rendered for mobilizing resources and undertaking activities during the year 2018 – 2019. In the previous year too, the institute received "Seva (service) award" from *E.S.L Narasimhan* (The hon'ble governor of AP). Many honorary awards have been awarded for this noble practice to the institution.

The students have donated 469 units of blood over the past five years and the summary for the past five academic years (2016-21) is shown in below table.

Around 20 villages are benefited by mineral water plant irrespective of their locality. This plant has been serving more than 20,000 liters of purified drinking water per day.

Problems Encountered

The institute came across a lot of myths and misconceptions among students regarding blood donation. Many students did not have basic or clear thought about the importance and use of blood donations. On many occasions the parents acted negatively through their ward was willing to come forward for blood donation. Few students did not come forward to contribute or help the needy.

Students expressed growing apprehension that the funds collected for the purpose would be misused. Institute took lots of pain in motivating and convincing the students. The institute itself contributed more funds for the needy when the collected funds were insufficient to meet the requirements of the needy.

Though had good intention of extending helping hand to the victims of natural calamities, the institute faced more logistical issues in distributing food and clothes to the needy in time.

Finally, the institute believes that giving a helping hand to a needy one is not only a responsibility but also an act of humanity.

Best Practice-2

$(Campus\ Recruitment\ Training\ (CRT)\ and\ Placement\ Activities\ -\ Focused\ and\ Skill\ Based\ Training)$

One of the salient features of the institute is CRT program. Sensing the future needs of corporate sector and skills that are in demand, the institution established a separate cell to improve the skill development among the students. The training experts monitor the students in all three year tenure of the graduation. In the final year nearly 6 months are allotted exclusively for the training. The students are given vigorous training in areas like Aptitude, Reasoning, Technical skills, and Communication skills.

Context:

It is the cherished dream of the institution to share the fruits of knowledge and play a vital role in molding young minds towards designed destinations. Aptly designed and properly implemented programs are blessing the institution with immaculate and imminent triumphs. The purposeful journey of the institution with an averted distinction is highly hopeful to make miraculous and thumping success in the educational spectrum. The unified target is being ventured with an association of stalwarts, who are the makers of remarkable achievements. The distinctive and majestic programs of the institution are designed to facilitate the confluence of knowledge, attitude and executions skills into.

Objectives:

- To create awareness of placement and selection process in the campuses to the students.
- To prepare students for placement activities
- To understand the importance of preparations before the placements
- To organize pre-placement training / workshops / mock-interviews / seminars for students.
- To provide resources and activities to facilitate the career planning process
- To impart oral and written communication skills and knowledge essential to successfully navigate the placement process
- To assist students to obtain placements in reputed companies.

The Practice:

The rigorous training program is meticulously planned and implemented by senior faculty members who possess meritorious record in their respective knowledge areas. CRT is an intense placement oriented drill. The training is conducted to train students for upcoming drives. Intensive training on technical and core knowledge of all streams are provided. Aptitude training programs are conducted to assess and enhance the candidate's problem solving capability. Analytical and Logical reasoning tests are conducted regularly to improve their ability. Conducting Group Discussion among the students on contemporary topics and guide them where they went wrong.

Exclusive training on communication, attitude, confidence, enthusiasm, behavior skills are provided to boost up the confidence. Mock interviews / Resume writing practices are conducted to enlighten their performance.

Evidence of Success:

The program is initiated with high expectation and vision to provide placements for the rural background students in and around 50 km radius of Chittoor. The ardent and sincere steps that the institution has taken started yielding very good results.

Problems encountered:

Most of the students of the college are from rural background, and they are from Telugu medium. Lack of Communication skills is one of the major hurdles for campus interview. Therefore, students faced issues with the communication in their interviews. Therefore, special attention is needed to improve their skills like communication, Personality development etc. Periodically CRT classes are conducted beyond the college class hours. However, a few students could not attend the classes due to logistic issues.

Another major challenge faced was many MNCs hesitate to come to our campus as the institute is located in semi-urban area.

Problems encountered:

- Unable to involve some of the female students in the outreach programs as their parents show reluctance to agree.
- Social stigma is noticed among some of the students especially from the marginalized sections of the society.
- The sense of inclusiveness and dynamism is lagging behind among certain students and the same to be inculcated still further.
- It is observed that some of the students are highly sensitive and could not maintain their emotional balance. In such cases the institution pays attention to bring changes in their perception towards holistic development.
- As Chittoor district is in the process of development economically and industrially, students find it difficult to get jobs locally. They are forced to find employment in nearby bordering states like Karnataka and Tamilnadu.
